Amid Haiti's Challenges, Haitian Congregation Continues Serving Those Living In Poverty (Update)

Amid Haiti's challenges, the Little Sisters of St. Thérèse of the Child Jesus continue serving those living in poverty. Sister Denise Desil, PSST, the Responsible General says, "We do something unique. We go to places where others don't go." "We have a very poor country, and we have a lot of challenges just to survive. We need to support people who count on us." One locale that counts on the Little Sisters of St. Thérèse is Baradères. The Little Sisters and other clinic personnel see about 100 patients a week in a 12-bed clinic and hospital. Among the constants in the area are malaria and typhoid, cholera, diarrhea, and water-borne diseases.
