Solidarity

Catholic Social Teaching tells us we belong to <u>one</u> human family regardless of our race, ethnicity, religion, economic status or ideological differences. Pope Francis in "Laudato Si" calls us citizens of one planet. This shared relationship with humanity is expressed in solidarity. Loving our neighbor which is at the heart of solidarity is biblical; but, today, it has global dimensions in a shrinking world. At the core of solidarity is the pursuit of justice and peace. It calls us to stand with and for our sisters and brothers in their pursuit of justice and in their desire for peace in a world of extremes, surrounded by violence and war. Solidarity is our focus for this year. When we stand with our sisters and brothers who are seeking higher wages, respect for life, voting rights, asylum in our country, we are practicing solidarity.

Respect Life

October is typically designated as **Respect Life Month**. Bishop Burbidge in his statement on Respect Life Month uses a term first coined by Pope John Paul II, "radical solidarity," which means to stand firm with "mothers-to-be" through every step of their pregnancy, birth and afterward, providing whatever resources they need. This accompaniment is a pro-life stance. It can also be applied to incarceration, migration, human trafficking and war.

"Restavek" Children in Haiti: A New Form of Modern-Day Slavery

"Restavek" is a Creole term stemming from the French expression "rester avec" which means "stay with." A restavek is a child in Haiti who is given away by their parents to work for a host household as a domestic servant because the parents lack the resources required to support the child. Restavek is a form of modern-day slavery that persists in Haiti, affecting one in every fifteen children.
