The Catechism tells us the *common good* is the "sum total of social conditions that allow people, either as groups or individuals, to reach their fulfillment more fully and more easily." (CCC#1906) In other words, the common good requires us to provide all that is necessary for people to thrive. The Catechism further says the *common good* is comprised of three essential elements: respect for the individual, the social well-being and development of the group and peace which results from the stability of a just society. This year let us look for the best ways to promote the *common good* in our society and in our world.

The last week in September marked the National Week of Migration. The theme of this week was: *God walks with His People*. This gives us pause for reflection as we are living in a time when migrants are being vilified in order to score political points. There are many risks that migrants face when crossing the border today: dangerous river and desert crossings, unsafe forms of transport, whether it is being jammed into trucks or riding atop trains. No one knows for sure the exact number of those who do not survive the crossing but the number we do know is in the thousands. Why? They are seeking a better, safer way of life for themselves and their families. It must be unbearable in their native countries if they are willing to make this journey, uncertain as to whether they will be accepted here or returned penniless to another country. Haiti Update

On September 30th the United Nations Security Council unanimously renewed a multinational security support mission (MSS) in Haiti to combat armed gangs until October 2025. The MSS, led by Kenya, now has some 400 police officers supporting the Haitian National Police. It has achieved some progress in wrestling back control from armed gangs in the Haitian capital Port-au-Prince, but the effort remains underfunded and has yet to push out the gangs controlling most of the city. Kenyan President William Ruto expects to deploy the entire police force of 2,500 officers by January 2025.

The Little Sisters of St. Therese emailed recently that they are okay, but always worry about the gangs for fear they will become more powerful in their dear Haiti.
