Poverty

It is a fact that many people are struggling right now. Prices are high and income is not commensurate with the cost of living. The Federal Government has created safety net programs to help low-income families cover the cost of basic necessities. They include food assistance programs such as SNAP, rental assistance for people who pay more than 50% of their income on rent, healthcare assistance through the Affordable Care Act, social security benefits to disabled children (SSI), and temporary financial assistance for needy families (TANF). All these programs are at risk as our administration seeks to rein in spending. The truth is spending cuts to any of the programs which are lifelines to families which exist at the lower end of the pay scale, would push many of them over the edge. Catholic Elements of Immigration Reform: For decades, the Catholic bishops of the United States have been consistent and steadfast in their calls for a just reform of the nation's immigration system. The elements of reform articulated below are grounded in Catholic social teaching generally and the Church's teaching on migration specifically, including the joint pastoral letter released by the American and Mexican bishops, *Strangers No Longer: Together on the Journey of Hope* (2003).
